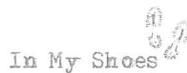

Health Information Exchange (HIE) Grant Program
Proposal Narrative

Arizona's Children Association/Southwest Network

1.) Brief organizational descriptions, including current use of health information exchange among partners (whether on paper, by phone or fax, or electronically).

Arizona's Children Association (AzCA) was originally founded in 1912, as Arizona Children's Home Association, the state's first accredited orphanage to care for homeless, neglected and dependent children. For 100 years, the agency has stayed true to its mission of "Protecting Children and Preserving Families," serving more than 46,000 children, individuals and families in all 15 counties in the state each year. Arizona's Children Association provides more than 20 programs, across every county in the state, each tailored to the needs of the particular child, individual or family. An invaluable resource in the areas of protecting children, preserving families and promoting safe communities, Arizona's Children Association is one of the only not-for-profit child welfare and behavioral health agencies in Arizona that can make that claim. All programs are family focused, strength based, culturally sensitive and outcome driven. They include foster and kinship care, adoption, crisis nursery, family support and preservation, prevention, counseling, sexual abuse treatment, early childhood education, Head Start, adult education, preventive health and fitness and a neighborhood Community Center. Arizona's Children Association does not currently have an electronic Health Information Exchange system in place; however, we do exchange information via paper, phone and fax.

Southwest Network (SWN) was formed in 1999 as a nonprofit corporation with the clear purpose to create partnerships, inspire hope and change lives. It provides behavioral health services to children, adults and families throughout Maricopa County and partners with providers, members of the community and the people they serve to change lives through their services and programs to help people lead lives of value. Southwest Network does not currently have an electronic Health Information Exchange system in place, however we do exchange information via paper, phone and fax.

2.) Geographic area and demographics of population(s) served.

Arizona's Children Association serves more than 12,000 children, families, and adults in Maricopa County, representing a spectrum of ethnicities and ages. Our behavioral health services are provided to disadvantaged children and families with the majority falling well below the federal poverty level. The economic status of those served is considered low-income based on the fact that those served in our behavioral health programs must qualify for the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS). In order to be eligible for AHCCCS families must be at 100% of the national poverty level.

Southwest Network serves over 20,000 children, adults and families in Maricopa County on an annual basis representing a wide range of ages and ethnicities. The majority of the population that we serve are low income adults and families that qualify for assistance through AHCCCS.

3.) Description of issue/business process that health information exchange will assist with improving.

Arizona's Children Association (AzCA) is proposing to develop the exchange of health information between Southwest Network (SWN) and itself to improve treatment and coordination of care for children enrolled in behavioral health services. AzCA is requesting support for the planning and implementation of a Unidirectional Direct Exchange: Query/Fax with SWN (point-to-point exchange); This exchange will consist of a Continuity of Care Document (CCD) summary of the patients clinical information in an electronic format.

Health Information Exchanges will improve the speed and efficiency of coordination of care while reducing errors. Currently, this impacts close to 3,000 clients. AzCA's current referral process is delayed due to the high number of manual work flows in relation to the transfer of paper documents and PDFs. This also includes some manual data entry into the Electronic Health Record (EHR). When referrals occur, effort is made in a manual process in order to pull and input data requiring employee resources. These tasks exist in a similar process when clients are transferred to other organizations that can not access our EHR. Redundant work occurs again with our Network as they have to manually re-enter and pull data from their system.

In particular, SWN and AzCA collaborate with high need cases simultaneously. An HIE exchange will also help with the coordination of care within this acuity group by improving the time it takes for behavior health professions to receive critical data in the clients chart. Employees from both organizations would no longer have to manually access their electronic health records, pull data out and send via corridor, email, and PDF. The manual pulling and inputting of documents also increases the possibility of errors as data is constantly manually re-entered into each system.

A specific example of the improvement a new HIE point-to-point exchange will create between agencies is updates with diagnosis and medication changes with shared clients will be seamless. Having that critical data greatly improves the quality of care, while reducing our risk. Arizona's Children Association plans to move toward the future of electronic data exchanges with other business partners and HIEs which will be an essential component of the provision of behavioral health services in our community.

4.) Describe how the HIE grant funds will enable to you meet your business objectives.

For Arizona's Children Association and Southwest Network, the proposed HIE grant will allow each agency to meet its objectives as a result of the following:

- Result in quicker access to care
- Result in a higher quality medical record for staff and outside agencies
- Medical record processes and procedures can be better standardized
- Greater compliance with required standards can be expected
- A reduction in duplication of services
- Reduction in operational costs by, automating many administrative tasks; eliminating paper, ink, and manual document printing; reducing or eliminating document faxing; reducing the need for associated and duplicate office equipment; eliminating the need to physically mail health charts; reducing the need for referrals; and reducing phone calls and follow-ups with labs for test results.
- Allows for each provider to more safely and effectively tailor care to patients' unique needs
- HIE supports "meaningful use"
- Improved satisfaction with services outcomes from program participants

5.) Describe how project will serve the needs of the underserved and low income populations you care for.

For the underserved and low income program participants each agency serves, the following can be expected as a result of HIE between both agencies:

- A higher quality of services through coordination of care.
- Improved quality and safety of patient care.
- Documentation will be much improved and workflow will be much more efficient.
- Stimulates consumer education and patients' involvement in their own health care.
- Participants will spend less time filling out forms and repeating information about their behavioral health history.
- Participants will not have to worry about forgetting an important detail about their behavioral health history, medications, or allergies when they are seen at behavioral health organizations.
- Participants may avoid having unnecessary duplicate diagnostic tests because other providers will be able to view the tests that have been ordered by other providers.
- Potential for better care because your providers will be able to access information more quickly.
- In an emergency, information about participants history may be readily available to the provider treating them.

Budget Narrative

Salaries & Fringe Benefits:

AzCA-Chief Information Officer, \$15,000 of salary will be paid for by the proposed grant, allocating 30% of his time to the project for six months. Activities performed are project management, training associated with HIE implementation, monitoring of budget. IT Support Specialist, \$10,000 of salary will be paid by AzCA's general operations funds towards meeting the grant match requirement, allocating 50% of employee's time to the project for six months. Activities performed are hardware implementation, technical assistance and support resources, project support, and training associated with HIE implementation.

Southwest Network - Chief Information Officer, \$25,000 of salary and ERE will be paid for by the proposed grant allocating 30% of his time to the project for six months. Activities performed are project management, training associated with HIE implementation, monitoring of budget. Senior Business Analysts, \$14,500 of salary and ERE will be paid for by the Southwest Network general operating funds allocating 50% of her time to the project for six months. Activities performed are testing, hardware implementation, technical assistance and support resources, project support, and training associated with HIE implementation. Business Analysts, \$14,000 of salary and ERE will be paid for by the proposed grant allocating 50% of her time to the project for six months. Activities performed are testing, hardware implementation, technical assistance and support resources, project support, and training associated with HIE implementation.

Travel:

AzCA-\$1,000 travel cost for an estimated 2,222 miles driving between Tucson and Phoenix for project collaboration with the software implementation company. The current agency reimbursement rate is .45 cents per mile.

Southwest Network - \$1,000 travel cost for an estimated 1,818 miles driving between Phoenix and Tucson for project collaboration with EHR vendor. The current agency reimbursement rate is .55 cents per mile.

Equipment:

AzCA-\$18,500 in estimated server hardware and installation cost needed to support new HIE software infrastructure. 2 HP ProLiant DL 500 servers will replace the existing NextGen hardware. Hardware upgrades are necessary to support latest NextGen software release requirements that support the new CCD format.

Software:

AzCA-AzCA's software vendor is Topaz Information Solutions, LLC who is an authorized reseller of NextGen. It is projected that AzCA will need to install NextGen interfaces and upgrade to the latest version of EHR software (Version 5.7) in order to be able to successfully generate and consume (bi-directional) CCD/CCR & HL7 transactions. Interfaces and implementation hours to upgrade NextGen is projected to cost \$30,000. AzCA is requesting that \$15,000 be funded by ASET and the remaining amount of \$15,000 be matched through regular operations.

Supplies:

AzCA-\$500 in training supplies, paper training packets, handouts, fliers, and printing.

Southwest Network - \$500 in training supplies, fliers and printing

In-kind match:

AzCA- \$25,000 (\$10,000 IT Support Specialist salary and \$15,000 software) in matching funds will come from AzCA's general operations funds.

Consultants/Contracted Services:

Southwest Network: System upgrade, programming and labor costs for EHR vendor system modifications to support CCD generation and acceptance and other changes to implement HIE exchange of information.
